I understand that Claude Johnson's first brief to Charles Sykes, was to create a mascot based of a figurine of the Greek Goddess of Victory, Nike, then in the Louvre. However, Sykes is said to have preferred a more



human subject, and (it is said) chose Eleanor Thornton, who was the model for The Whisper, the mascot created for Lord Montagu's Silver Ghost. I suspect that the central figure in the collage is indeed a representation of Nike, and I also consider





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that Charles Sykes was correct in his decision! A statue of Nike, is, perhaps, more famously situated on top of the Brandenburg Gate in Berlin.

ALSACE RALLY 5 to 8 October 2017

Since a couple of years a number of « Enthusiasts » have asked us to organize a trip to the nice Alsace region at vintage time.

We are lucky that board member Jacques Mauffré knows the region very well and he is ready to organize a rally open to all RREC sections assisted by Jean-Pierre Boiroux.

Jacques has already worked hard on the following program that includes surprises that cannot yet be revealed....

During the whole stay we'll be based at Château d'Isembourg at Rouffach near Colmar. This outstanding property has 40 rooms which will be at our entire disposal. Room faire is between € 150 to 300. Booking will be individual.



Nearby, another hotel offers rooms for less than € 90.

Arrival will be in the afternoon of 5 October, check-in, welcome drinks and dinner.

Starting next morning we'll discover the marvels of Alsace, its typical villages from medieval times, the "little Venice" on the river Lauch, lunch in a country cottage.



On Saturday we'll take the "Rhine route" through Neuf Brisach, built by Vauban (classified as cultural heritage by UNESCO)... arrival at the Schlumpf Museum. There is the possibility of having a Gala Dinner at the museum surrounded by automobiles... for an additional cost (approximately € 100) but it's a privilege and an unforgettable souvenir.

On Sunday we drive to Haut Koenigsbourg Castle through the "Weinstrasse" where we will be welcomed for a visit and wine tasting at Interviller Castle by Earl Andlau-Hombourg and his wife.

Lunch and end of rally. There is the possibility of staying one more night at the hotel.
