


Roger's Ramblings

Contact Point Comments

The Sunday lunch event organised by Martin and Jackie Vinson at the Honest Lawyer on 22 March was an enjoyable start to the events season for the section with 35 people in attendance on a fine sunny day resulting in some attending in their "club" cars which is always good to see. The layout of the dining room resulted in a bit of a squeeze, which was probably a contributory factor to a couple of accidents during the serving of the meal and I trust that those affected by those accidents have taken up the offer of redress made by the Honest Lawyer Management.



Derek Moss was not present on 22 March, but had indicated that the numbers at that stage looking to attend the Garden Centre event on 29 March that he had organised, were so low that it looked like the event would have to be cancelled. However, this led to a vigorous promotion of the event at the Honest Lawyer resulting in 20 attending the Garden Centre for what has been described as a relaxed social outing. The event was supported by a £50.00 cost subsidy from Section funds in line with the policy adopted for membership benefits.

This experience perhaps reinforces the need to be somehow more proactive in verbally seeking your support to attend events, but as a relatively new kid on the block I think that task needs to be picked up by a long standing member who is more familiar than I am with individual section members — is there any-one out there willing to take that job on of contacting members on an individual basis to try to garner support for forthcoming events?

The situation with events going forward is that with only seven responses the Bowes Museum event on 19 April had to be cancelled. The Drive it Day event, on 26 April, is being organised by the Middlesbrough and District Motor Club and Jaguar DC but so far only 3 Section members have signed up. The £30.00 cost per car of two people includes refreshments on arrival and a carvery two course lunch. Additional passengers cost £12.00. I have never been on an organised drive like this before and am participating despite the 100 mile round trip to get to it and would hope that more of our members living in the Middlesbrough environs would look to join in. Finally, and recognising that it is not until 11 July, the Sunderland Air Museum event has attracted just two responses to date. The organisers have specifically asked if the





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club would exhibit up to 10 "club" cars.

I continue to be ably supported by Martin Vinson in my attempts to discharge the many and varied tasks that fall to the Secretary of this Section to address but, given that I am also Treasurer of the Section, I will be looking to hand the baton of Secretary on at the AGM. The implementation of a membership fee does suggest that the introduction of a Membership Secretary also to deal with correspondence from Hunt House relating to new Club members and resignations from the Club, would assist in spreading the load of managing the administration of the Section and ensuring that everything is efficiently and effectively dealt with. I would therefore ask if each of you would give some serious consideration to taking on one or other of these two important roles at the next AGM.

I look forward to your continuing support for the Section and the events that have been organised by your Committee for your delectation in the forthcoming months!

Jackie and I have recently been on a weekend trip to Holland, actually arranged and organised by Area 11 of the JDC. We visited the Keukenhof gardens and a "touristy" fishing village, but the main attraction for me was the Louwman Motor Museum at Den Haag. This was a fantastic collection of carts, carriages and motor cars showing the development of the motor vehicle from the horse drawn carts of the nineteenth century, through the luxury vehicles of the 1920s and 30s to the everyday and racing cars of the 1930s,1940s,1950s,1960s and later. It is a family museum dating back to 1934. Most of the cars are in their original condition, alt-





hough some have been restored. It is the policy of the museum to retain the patina






of age, but also, whenever possible, to use the exhibits on the road. As a result of



this there was at least one empty space, I think in this instance because the car was in use on the Mille Miglia. It is my guess that there are about 250 vehicles on display, some of which are unique. I would highly recommend a visit if you are ever in that part of the world, but you will need a full day to do it justice.









And finally the really weird - 1910 Brooke 25/30 Swan Car. The car was built for a wealthy Englishman who lived in Calcutta. Apart from the normal lights there are bulbs in the swan's eyes which glow in the dark. There is an exhaust driven eight



tone Gabriel horn, operated from a keyboard in the back. Brushes are fitted to the wheels to keep the elephant dung off the tyres. The beak is connected to the cooling system allowing the driver to spray steam onto pedestrians who get in the way. Not least; whitewash could be dumped onto the road from the rear to give an even more life like appearance! Not surprisingly the car caused chaos and panic on its first appearance and police had to be called. It was later sold to the Maharaja of Nabha, who kept the car for over seventy years.
