Contact point comments

The season kicked off with our first section event of the year on 13th March. This was a road run and meal at Simonstone Hall, near Hawes, which was enjoyed by the 17 in attendance, and is reported more fully elsewhere in the Newsletter.

I attended the RREC annual conference this year with Roger Hall and we were billeted for the weekend at the Marriott Hotel, Northampton. This hotel is just to the east of the M1 on the road into Northampton and both food and accommodation were excellent.

The Hunt House is about 12 miles to the West from the

hotel and this was my first and fascinating attendance at the facility. Business commenced with the AGM followed by the Conference, and I expect that these will both be fully reported in the Bulletin in due course.

I thought the AGM was handled well, in a business-like and professional manner, and it was clear that the relationship between the Sir Henry Royce Memorial Foundation and the RREC is very much more positive than perhaps it has been in the recent past. However, it also became clear that the issues of governance had not been

Thus, the AGM accepted a proposal from the outgoing chairman, Duncan Feetham, that he stand down from the RREC Board in order to accommodate the appointment of two others and thereby avoid the need to run another election process. Questions were also raised about a severance payment and confidentiality agreement with a former RREC employee and the appointment process relating to a current employee. All matters raised were dealt with to the satisfaction of the delegates present.

The Conference was a very much more relaxed affair, ably chaired by Ted Meacham, Central Southern Section Secretary. The conference subjects for discussion had been previously circulated to Sections to seek their views, together with a paper setting out some proposals to try to increase membership, and reduce RREC membership loss rates. There was considerable agreement in Section opinions about the matters discussed, judging from the comments made by delegates.

The highlights for me were first, a membership presentation and secondly an excellent presentation from Andrew Ball, Global Corporate Communications Manager, Rolls-Royce Motor Cars Ltd.

The membership presentation probably raised more questions than it answered but drew out that there are significantly more owners of Bentley motor cars about than there are owners of Rolls-Royce motor cars. This led to some discussion about the incorporation of the Bentley name into the club name. I reported the comments of a member of our Section Committee, who in recognising that the club was a staid organisation, suggested that more radical solutions to go forward successfully than tinkering with the name, would be required.

A specific question asked was whether the £30.00 joining fee should be scrapped, and there was a lot of vocal opinion that it should be scrapped, not least because of the concessions made to those joining at the NEC event in Birmingham.

Andrew Ball had arranged that a Rolls-Royce Dawn was available for delegates to examine. This handsome new soft top is described as the most luxurious convertible in the world and has won the prestigious "Luxury car of the year award". The bright orange upholstery of the vehicle was not to my liking, but the real surprise for me was how limited the legroom was for back seat occupants.

Finally, the other issue which did strike me was the excellent spoken English from all the continental delegates that I had occasion to meet and speak to. I would be surprised if their linguistic skills could be matched by the delegates from this side of the channel, but then, I guess that English is still the international language of the world! (Pas si vous êtes Français! Ed)

Here is a slightly edited version of an article that I found in the Daily Telegraph, Motoring Section recently: Campaign Groups say that the £50m pothole fund falls significantly short of what is required to repair local roads, and that, in fact, councils need 230 times more than the £50 million pledged by Government.

That is according to the Local Government Association, which described the first instalment of the Government's Pothole Action Fund as merely "a step in the right direction". In total, the LGA says the backlog in maintenance required to bring our roads up to a satisfactory standard, amounts to a little under *an eye watering* £12 billion, adding that for the average authority to bring its roads up to "reasonable condition" is £69 million. (Or about a tenth of the amount given in aid to one third world country, which then squandered it.)

It is understood that the Government featured the five-year, £250 million Pothole Action Fund in last month's Budget, and it appears that the £50m is an initial instalment to pay for the repair of one million potholes. Patrick McLoughlin, the Transport Secretary, said the money to repair potholes formed part of a £6.1 billion investment for local road maintenance over the next five years.

However, councillor Martin Tett, LGA Transport spokesman, said that the condition of our roads is only going to get worse, unless we address it as a national priority, and that the Government's own traffic projections predict a potential increase in traffic of up to 55 per cent by 2040. (If that is true the roads are going to be so crowded, and we will all be driving so slowly, we shall not need to bother with the potholes. I shall be 97 in 2040, so, happily, will not see it.)

Go to: www.potholes.co.uk, which gives information about how to report potholes, or how to claim if you car has been damaged by one. David Gerrans, Potholes.co.uk managing director, said that any money that central Government puts towards road maintenance was welcomed, but £50 million was not going to allow local authorities to carry out the permanent fix that was needed.

It seems that there is a huge backlog that will take years to make good, unless much more money is available to carry out the work.

Consequently it will continue to be us, the drivers who use the road network, who will pay for it, when we have to pay for the repairs to our cars.

Maybe I am wrong, it's not unusual, but surely many of the potholes are caused by the even heavier heavy goods vehicles now permitted on our roads by the EU that does not have to worry about the damage they cause.

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
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
